The persuasive power of the moral case for fossil fuels

INTRODUCTION

If you follow the energy debate at all, you've probably heard some version of the following:

- "It's a lost cause."
- "People don't change their minds about fossil fuels."
- "People are too stupid/irrational/emotional to understand the case for fossil fuels."

When I started writing about energy over 10 years ago, I wanted to offer people the most effective, persuasive materials in the moral case for fossil fuels ever created. It was my belief that if that case was presented clearly and logically, it was possible to genuinely change hearts and minds.

Now I know it.

Over the last decade, I have released everything from free online articles and videos to speeches to the book The Moral Case for Fossil Fuels. The response has been phenomenal.

We recently surveyed 735 members of the public who are familiar with my work, but who are not part of the fossil fuel industry, and asked them:

"On a scale of 0 (not at all) to 10 (extremely) how would you rate yourself before and after encountering Alex Epstein's work on fossil fuels?"

The results were striking:

- 40% increase in interest in fossil fuels--from a 6 to an 8.5
- 42% increase in how positively they view the fossil fuel industry--from a 6 to a 9
- 125% increase in how confident they feel turning non-supporters into supporters--from a 3 to a
 6.5
- 68% increase in eagerness to champion the fossil fuel industry--from a 5 to an 8

- 48% increase in willingness to recommend a career in the fossil fuel industry--from a 5.5 to an 8
- 52% increase in understanding of the positive impacts of the fossil fuel industry on human life-from a 6 to a 9
- 95% increase in understanding of the positive impacts of the fossil fuel industry on our environment--from a 4.5 to an 8.5
- 61% increase in understanding of the major concerns about fossil fuels--from a 5.5 to an 8.5

Even more striking, when we gave a similar survey to members of the fossil fuel industry, what we discovered was that, after consuming our material, members of the public had a more positive view of the fossil fuel industry and a greater willingness and ability to champion it than did industry members prior to consuming our material.

All of this is consistent with the thousands of pieces of feedback I've received from people inside and outside the industry testifying to the impact that CIP's material has had on their views-and their lives, confirming my early conviction: that there is an incredible potential to convince people of the truth that fossil fuels are a healthy choice, not a dangerous addiction--and to empower them to become eager and effective champions of the fossil fuel industry.

In this book, you'll find 1000 of my personal favorite testimonials. I hope you find them as inspiring as I do.

Today's young people have received lifelong indoctrination in the moral case against fossil fuels, and are unsurprisingly overwhelmingly skeptical of fossil fuels—but our work is changing that.

I was already intuitively convinced of the benefits of fossil fuels before reading The Moral Case. but the book clarified my thinking on this issue and helped me better articulate the reasoning for my position. The key to the clarification of my thinking was the book's clear explanation of the three methods for analyzing the issue-(1) that we must look at the big picture (i.e., both the benefits and risks of all alternative solutions to an issue), (2) that we must be clear on our moral standard for judging an issue (i.e., in the case of energy, either the inhuman ideal of minimizing impact on the environment regardless of the consequences to human beings, or maximization of human flourishing), and (3) that we must treat experts properly (i.e., as advisors who are obligated to prove their case rather than as authorities to be obeyed without question).

At least in my case, I believe Alex achieved the goal of the "How to Talk to Anyone About Energy" course--intwo hours to make supporters of energy abundance twice as effective at persuading people about energy and environmental issues. I have tried using the methods taught in the materials in conversations with my wife's grandmother, who is a misguided green movement

dogmatist. Previously, our conversations about energy have quickly spiraled into anger and the fruitless hurling of zingers at each other (at my peril, although we do love each other).
